Throughout its history, the Olympic Games have held a range of strange and unusual competitions that we no longer take part in today.

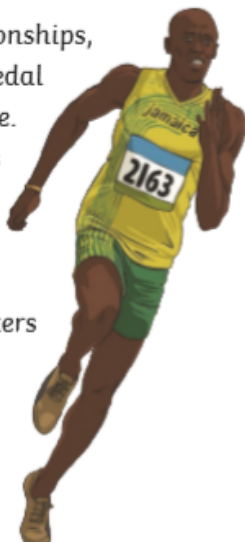

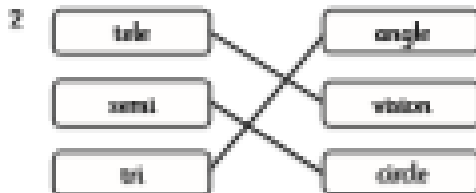
