

How to Make a Christingle Candle

You will need:

- 1 orange
- 1 birthday candle
- 1 small piece of foil measuring
- 6cm by 6cm to catch dripping wax
- · enough red ribbon or red tape to go all the way around the middle of the orange
- 4 cocktail sticks (adults to cut the pointy bits off first)
- soft sweets or dried fruit (12 pieces per Christingle)


Instructions



1. First, stick a piece of red tape or ribbon around the middle of your orange. You might need an extra pair of hands with this bit.




2. Next, wrap the foil around the bottom of the candle to make a sort of saucer to catch the wax.



3. Then ask an adult to make a hole in the top of the orange and wedge the candle (with foil) firmly inside the hole.



 Put fruit or soft sweets onto 4 cocktail sticks. WARNING - Please be careful, the cocktail sticks may still be sharp.



5. Push the 4 sticks into the orange, one in each quarter of the top half of the orange. Make sure the sticks point slightly upwards. WARNING - Lighting candles is dangerous. Children should always be supervised by an adult.

Christingle **Answers**

Christingle services are held during **Advent** in churches. The Christingle is made from an **orange**, red tape or ribbon, sweets and a **candle**.

The orange represents the world.

The red tape or ribbons represents the **blood** and love of Jesus.

The sweets and dried fruits represent all of God's creations.

The lit candle represents Jesus' *light* in the world, bringing hope to people who are living in darkness.

Example answer.

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

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Christingle services are held during Advent in churches.

Feeling	Why might they feel this way?

joyful	Christmas is coming and Christians rejoice at the celebration of the birth of Christ.
thoughtful	As Christians prepare for Christmas, they think about their own lives and what Jesus means to them and how they can live better lives. They spend lots of time in prayer too during Advent.
loved by God	As candles are lit during Advent and at the Christingle service, Christians remember that Jesus is there for them.
excited	Christians feel excited about the big celebration on Christmas Day. There is lots of preparation and anticipation leading up to the birth of Jesus during Advent and in a Christingle service.







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

Christingle **Answers**

The following information might be included in a fact sheet...

Christingle services are held during Advent in churches. The Christingle is made from an orange, red tape or ribbon, sweets and a candle. The symbol of light is central to a Christingle service. The word Christingle means 'Christ's light'.

The orange represents the world.

The red tape or ribbons represents the blood and love of Jesus.

The sweets and dried fruits represent all of God's creations.

The lit candle represents Jesus' light in the world, bringing hope to people who are living in darkness.

The first Christingle service was held in 1747. A bishop called Johannes de Watteville in Marienborn, Germany gave children a lighted candle with a red ribbon about it and talked to them about his message that following Jesus brings happiness.

In 1968 the Christingle was adapted to include the addition of the orange, sticks and sweets and was introduced to the Church of England. The new Christingle was first used by John Pensom in a service where he was raising money for a charity called The Children's Society.

Since 1968, Christingle services have been held every year. This service was very much designed with children in mind and, when Christingle services are held nowadays, a collection of money is taken so that people donate money to The Children's Society.

During Advent and at a Christingle service, Christians are thoughtful and reflective. As they prepare for the birth of Christ, they reflect on the birth of Jesus and what Jesus means to them and how they can live differently. They spend time praying as they prepare for Christmas. A Christingle service is also a time for Christians to rejoice. They are preparing to celebrate the birth of Jesus and they feel joyful and excited about this. They might feel hopeful at a Christingle service because light is a symbol that Jesus brings hope in darkness.
